During June, smoke from the Canadian wildfires caused poor air quality for a large portion of the US population, extending from the Midwest to the East Coast. Here in Northwest Indiana, we noticed the smell of smoke and observed the hazy conditions. I did not anticipate it would be this bad and I am guessing you did not either. Wildfire issues are not limited to Canada; they also occur in other regions—The US West Coast, particularly California, has experienced significant wildfire problems. Australia has also experienced major wildfire incidents, particularly in regions such as New South Wales and other states during the 2019-2020 fire season. Apart from the challenges posed by wildfires, urban flooding has emerged as an unexpected problem affecting various regions worldwide, including China, Japan, and Cambodia in recent times. Additionally, the first week of July 2023 broke global temperature records, with an average temperature 1.61 degrees Celsius (2.90 degrees Fahrenheit) higher than the 20th century average, as reported by the Copernicus Climate Change Service.

The world is going through a period of significant ecological changes and challenges, with noticeable and dramatic events happening all around. From your perspective, what do you think might be the root causes behind these natural crises? How do you perceive the connection between these unfolding events and our faith? Even among Christians, there are many who are skeptical about climate change, especially when scientists express concerns. It is important to refrain from being judgmental towards each other's beliefs, regardless of whether we personally support or oppose the idea. While there may be differing opinions and skepticism surrounding climate change, it is important for us to reflect on our responsibility towards the environment and creation. While acknowledging that God holds ultimate authority over all creation, we are called to be good stewards of the Earth.

According to the passage in Genesis 1:28, God addressed human beings with the following instruction:

**“Be fruitful and multiply, and fill the earth and subdue it; and have dominion over the fish of the sea and over the birds of the air and over every living thing that moves upon the earth.”**

Human beings are created in the image of God and have been entrusted with the command to multiply, populate the earth, exercise stewardship over it, and have dominion over all its living creatures. According to theologian Daniel L. Migliore in his book “Faith seeking Understanding”:

**“human beings are given the responsibility of caring for the whole of creation as God cares for it. It is a ‘dominion’ of care and protection rather than of domination and abuse.”**

Let us pause and contemplate the following question: Are we living up to our responsibility with a mindset of nurturing and safeguarding, rather than one of dominating, as we care for the Earth and God's creations?

Fossil fuels, like coal, oil, and natural gas are very important for producing energy worldwide. In fact, about 80% of the energy we use comes from these fuels. We rely on them for things like transportation, making electricity, and even flying in airplanes. It's hard to imagine a world without them because they play such a big role in our daily lives. Even though we rely heavily on fossil fuels for energy, it is crucial that we keep searching for alternative sources and remember our responsibility to care for and value the world that God has made.

What does it mean to be good stewards of natural resources and how can stewardship of the earth be practiced in communities of faith? How can we integrate our faith values into our daily actions to better care for God's creation?

**“The earth is the LORD's and all that is in it, the world and those who live in it; for he has founded it on the seas, and established it on the rivers.” Psalm 24:1-2**






**Feeding the Community**

Greetings from worship and music,


