

# First Presbyterian News May 2024 401 Lincolnway East Mishawaka, IN. 46544

In accordance with the Constitution of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.); ministers, ruling elders, and deacons are presented with a pivotal question that reaffirms our dedication to Christ's mission. This question encapsulates our commitment to serving and ministering to our community, reflecting the core values of our faith.

The very first constitutional question addressed to church leaders is:

"Do you trust in the Lord Jesus Christ your Savior, acknowledge Him Lord of all and Head of the Church, and through Him believe in one God, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit?

This question is not just about what you know; it's about the depth of your faith and confidence in your calling. When you answer, you are not just stating facts; you are making a solemn commitment before God and the congregation, affirming your trust in your decisions and actions. Acknowledging Jesus as your Lord means promising to live as He did—loving others, showing kindness, forgiving, and putting others before yourself. It's about following His lead and trying to be like Him in everything you do.

By following Christ's example, you also express your faith in the Triune God: the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. The Trinity is hard to explain because it is like trying to understand how God can be three persons in one. Throughout history, theologians and scholars have grappled with various interpretations and explanations of this mystery, leading to a wide range of perspectives and debates within the Christian faith. I am not delving into deep theological discussions, but here's a simplified statement: the Trinity is the idea that God is the Father, Son (Jesus), and Holy Spirit—all together as one divine being. This concept also mirrors our Presbyterian government structure, where authority is shared among ministers, ruling elders, and governing bodies.

Reflecting on my recent installation ceremony as the designated minister of our church last month, I am profoundly thankful and blessed to serve as your pastor. Words cannot adequately convey my gratitude for the unwavering support, prayers, and love from our beloved FPC family and friends. Five years ago, on April 14th, 2019, I was ordained with excitement and thankfulness. However, the recent installation ceremony on April 21st, 2024, brought forth deeper emotions, reminding me of the blessings bestowed upon me and encouraging further personal growth and reflection. When asked the same first constitutional question as five years ago, it felt like a divine challenge, urging me to reaffirm my faith and embark on a life journey guided by humility, steadfast dedication, and reverence.

What does this mean to me? It means that I cannot accomplish everything alone; I continually need your support. Leading the church is not a solitary endeavor—I depend on elders who bring their unique gifts and leadership to areas where I may lack. Similarly, ministering to those in need requires the compassionate service of deacons, who play a vital role in the governance of our church. But it's not just elders and deacons that I need; I need all of you—everyone reading this pastoral letter.

Allow me to remind you of the words form 1 Peter 2: 9

"But you are a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, Gods' own people, in order that you may proclaim the mighty acts of Him who called you out of darkness into his marvelous light."

This verse serves as a reminder that you are all chosen by God, called to proclaim His glorious deeds.

Shall we join together in embracing the challenges and opportunities ahead? Will we commit to serving our congregation with dedication and love? Will we wholeheartedly follow Christ, seeking to live out His example in everything we do?

Let us embark on this journey together, united in faith, and purpose, as we strive to glorify God and serve His people.

In the course of going through old records and reports, I came across several articles that Irene Arndt wrote for the Newsletter back in 1991; highlighting Memorial Gifts. She wrote these as 4 different installments. I would like to share with you what she wrote and I hope that you find this as interesting as I did.

#### OUR CHURCH AND MEMORIALS...by Irene Arndt

fifteen-plus years.

Part I... We are in our fourth church building in Mishawaka. The first church was built with donated labor and barter. It was occupied in the Fall of 1837. The name used by the group was "The First Trinitarian Society of the Village of St. Joseph Iron Works, Inc." The growth of the congregation and the village caused the Society to begin a second church in 1844, and they moved into it in 1846. It was located on the southeast corner of Lincolnway and Mill Streets. This building was destroyed by the 'great Mishawaka fire' in 1872. One week after the fire, subscriptions began for rebuilding with brick upon the old foundation. Services were held in this third building exactly four months later, January 5, 1873. As the fiftieth anniversary date approached, members tried to complete church furnishing with gifts. Mrs. Julia Badger gave a silver baptismal font; in 1876, Robert Montgomery gave the bell that has called Mishawaka Presbyterians to worship for over 115 years. These were the first of our memorials. Part II...The congregation continued to grow, and a larger new church was planned; it is our present building. The church name was changed to 'The First Presbyterian Church of Mishawaka, Indiana,' and the building was dedicated on March 30, 1911. History tells us that in the late 1800's and early 1900's, memorials were an important aid in furnishing the church. Often money was given because of need for a specific item. These items, without exception, all had qualities of permanence and were of definite importance to the church. Some of the earliest memorials were the stained glass windows, the piano, the organ chimes, pulpit furniture, and later the furnishings for the Christian Education Building lobby, library shelves, and books, etc. Several sizable bequests were given from time to time; these generally made up the investment reserves of the church. The lovely Memorial Registers, one in the case in the Narthex and one in Memorial Lounge, gave an accurate record of Memorial Gifts from 1876 through most of 1990. Over two-hundred accounts of individuals have been used and closed in the last

Part III...Dr. Meengs always made an annual report of the Memorial Fund. In 1974, Reverend May requested that past memorials to the church be researched and that formal record keeping be initiated. A committee, led by a member of Session as chairperson, has been active since that time. The financial record for the committee was started January 1, 1975, with a balance of \$1,822.00. The record of previous expenditures had been given in the annual report. In round figures, about \$70,000.00 has come into the fund, and about \$60,000.000 has been used for accessories and necessities during the past fifteen-plus years. The value of gifts given directly to the church i.e., Bibles, Hymnals, pew cushions, Memorial Lounge, furniture in the Christian Education lobby, is not included in the above figure. For the comfort and pleasure of all members during the past fifteen-plus years, the Memorial Committee allocated over \$14,000.00 for the lower level renovation, over \$12,000.00 to the Music Department, \$14,000.00 for the elevator, \$8,600.00 for air conditioning renewal, \$7,000.00 for sanctuary audio equipment, \$1,500.00 for draperies and carpeting, and over \$600.00 for sidewalks and railings.

Part IV...Donating to Memorial Fund offers an easy plan for two way benefits in lieu of flowers at times of family sorrow; and when a memorial is received, a sympathy card is sent to the bereaved, an acknowledgment is sent to the donor, and the contribution will aid the church. The Fund includes all cash gifts of \$1,000 or less. Gifts of over \$1,000 are deposited in the Memorial Endowment Fund. Families may establish specific memorials through the Memorial Committee. The Committee, whenever possible, honors the family's request for the use of the donation. Most often the family has no special request. It has always been the policy of the Committee to not allow monies to be used for operational costs of the church. It was decided by the Trustees some time ago that no plaques would be used on gifts in the future. The pages in the Registers in the Narthex and in the Memorial Lounge are turned almost weekly. The Fund now has a balance of \$3,695.00 and a one year C.D. for \$7,000.00. Donations are received in the church office by the church secretary; she also records the donors at that time. The financial secretary then receives the money, records, and deposits it. She audits and files the bank statements. From their records, Irene Arndt has kept a complete record for the Memorial Committee. The Committee arranges for the information and printing in the Memorial Register. - Irene Arndt.
