A MESSAGE FROM PASTOR DANIEL

On June 10th, I am going to Seattle and will be taking a road trip with Jae on our way back to Mishawaka. Although we are going to miss attending Jae's graduation ceremony in June due to Coronavirus, we are very excited to get back together, for another chapter of our life here in Mishawaka.

It has been more than a year that we have been living apart from each other. Due to Jae's last year of Doctor of Nursing Practice program at Seattle Pacific University, I had to move here by myself in early March 2019. I had no problem of adjusting and settling my life in Mishawaka because the FPC family and staff treated me well with love, care and kindness. However, one of the biggest challenges for living by myself was missing Jae's physical presence.

Although we have been able to stay in touch with each other through FaceTime (video calling) almost every day, it couldn't offer a greater level of intimacy than an in-person interaction.

For more than a month, we've missed in-person services on Sunday, and I wonder how you have felt about having online service in general. What was your biggest challenge having online Sunday service? Were you able to follow and keep up with Sunday service at your own place? Were you able to feel connected with other members in church through online service? What did you miss most about coming to church on Sunday?

Every time I came to the church sanctuary for recording my Sunday message, I missed everything we do on Sunday. I missed seeing your faces, passing the peace, singing hymns together, hearing the voice of our choir & the sound of music, and our fellowship downstairs.

Fortunately, we have been able to stay in touch with one another by using email, social media, texting and phone call while social distancing; however, were you able to fully express your thoughts or feelings to others? According to a UCLA study, up to 93 percent of all communication is nonverbal which includes eye contact, facial expression, body language and posture.

Whether you agree or disagree, I think we communicate far better when we actually see each other. Person to person contact is necessary for us to express our thoughts, feelings, information, as well as understating what is expressed by others. We feel closer and connected with one another when we are physically together.

If you look at the life of early Christian community in Acts, they were always together both physically and spiritually. This is what the author of Acts writes regarding about the ongoing life of the early church, **"Day by day, as they spent much time together in the temple, they broke bread at home and ate their food with glad and generous hearts, praising God and having the goodwill of all people."** (Acts 2:46)

– **Malawi Matters** Phyllis Wezeman, a member of First Presbyterian Church in South Bend, was approached about starting a mission focusing on HIV and AIDS education and in 2009 **Malawi Matters** was formed. Their mission is to develop and facilitate HIV and AIDS education with the people of Malawi, Africa. Building on their HIV/AIDS education, they saw a need to help young women of Malawi and developed the program “Equipping Women, Empowering Girls.” It encourages girls to stay in school, builds self-esteem, works to prevent child and forced marriages, prevent unplanned pregnancy, and reduce the cycle of poverty. This program was presented to PW in 2017 at our Winter Gathering. From this program we began making period pads for the young girls in Malawi to allow them to stay in school. Materials needed to make the pads are towels, flannel, soft cloth & waterproof vinyl. Items can be donated in the basket in the CE Lobby. We meet once or twice a year to cut, assemble and sew the pads. We have made approx. 421 pads to date.

– **Sew Love Inc.** Their program, which began in late 2012, teaches sewing and quilting classes to underserved and marginalized women areas of South Bend, Indiana. They provide a positive “hands on” program for women to learn and practice a variety of life-enhancing skills, such as perseverance, patience and problem solving. The program gives women the opportunity through quilting to explore personal creativity and to give back to the community. It is nurturing each woman’s self-confidence and self-esteem by enhancing their success at living productively in their community, encouraging them to take their next step toward a full and meaningful life, adding valuable life skills, and helping each person discover their worth to God and the community. They desire each participant to be a part of developing a vibrant, safe and strong community with strong families.

During the recent quarantine months, They set a goal to make 100,000 masks. Mary Ann Dentino sewed 100 masks herself to be distributed to hospitals and facilities in need.

– **Busy Hands of Michiana** is an award winning, all volunteer, non-profit charity. Over the years PW has donated miscellaneous materials which volunteers use to create special, therapeutic and comforting items for those in need and are distributed through various agencies to help those who struggle with Alzheimer’s and Autism, as well as Cancer patients, Nursing Homes, Hospice Patients, Homeless, Children and Infants and those with other life challenging situations. Busy Hands is also busy making masks.

GUIDELINES FOR RESUMING LIVE SERVICES

1. We are encouraging social distancing until we have a different directive from the Presbytery or State.
2. We require the wearing of masks. These masks are to protect those around us. Social distancing and hand washing or sanitizer will protect you.
3. Brandon is encouraging us to not sing the hymns. Just follow along with the words or hum. Droplets spread further with singing or talking loudly. Brandon will play the hymns at the same time in the service and of course we will still enjoy his prelude and postlude.
4. During the service Pastor Daniel and the liturgist will be self-miked rather than share the pulpit microphone.
5. The greeter will be stationed by the east door in case we have visitors but at this time will not shake hands.
6. The bulletins will be on the table in the narthex. The ushers will be there to open and close doors and assist if needed.
7. A collection plate will be placed in the back of the sanctuary. You can drop your offering in when you enter or leave.
8. Passing of the peace will be verbal with the liturgist saying "May the Peace of Christ be with you" and our communal response "And also with you".
9. Communion will be served May 31st for Pentecost. We will go back to using our beautiful Communion Service. Grape juice will be in one glass and bread will be on toothpicks in a basket or tray.
10. At this time, fellowship will be not be held in Fellowship Hall following the service. A special fellowship is being planned for Brandon on May 31st, thanking him for his years of being our organist and choir director and also congratulating him on his graduation with the Doctorate from Notre Dame. It will probably be outside where we can observe social distancing.
