Every Christmas season, heartwarming stories are shared, and this one is my personal favorite. While it may be a classic tale—and some even say it's based on a true story (though there isn't enough proof) - I had the privilege of sharing it in a children's Christmas pageant, using puppets, during my previous ministry in Seattle, Washington. It's a story that always resonates deeply. Here's the story, with a few changes I made:

As Christmas approached, a small school decided to put on a special Christmas play. Wally, a fourth grader with a heart full of kindness, was eager to be part of it. Although Wally faced challenges with speech and learning, he was more excited than anyone to take part. His teacher, recognizing his enthusiasm, assigned him a role that was simple but meaningful—the innkeeper, who turns Mary and Joseph away. In the play, Wally's task was to say just one line: "There's no room", when Joseph knocked on the door. His teacher worked closely with him, helping him practice every day. Wally focused on getting it just right, knowing that Joseph would ask for a room and his response would be, "There's no room." The night of the play arrived, and the excitement was palpable. Wally stood backstage, eagerly waiting for his cue. When the moment came, Joseph and Mary arrived at the inn. Mary, appearing tired and in pain, leaned on Joseph as he knocked on the door. Wally opened the door and, as he had practiced, said clearly, "There's no room." Joseph pleaded, "Please, my wife is about to give birth. Can't you spare a room?" Wally repeated his line, "There's no room."

Everything seemed to be going smoothly, but then Joseph asked one final time, "Please, it's so cold, and my wife is about to have a baby. We have nowhere else to go." At that moment, something changed in Wally. His face softened, and his eyes filled with tears. Breaking from the script, he looked at Mary and Joseph and said, "You can have my room."

Some people in town thought that the pageant had been ruined. Yet there were others—many, many others—who considered it the most Christmas of all Christmas pageants they had ever seen.

Wally's heartfelt words remind us of the essence of Christmas: making space for others, for kindness and for the true message of hope that the season represents. His simple act of offering his room symbolizes the love and generosity that we are called to share, not just with those close to us, but with anyone in need. December is one of the busiest times of the year, with people all around the world preparing for Christmas. For many, it's a time of excitement, celebration, and spending time with family and friends. But in the midst of all the activity, it's also a chance to slow down and think about the true meaning of Christmas. This season encourages us to look past the busy preparations and reconnect with the spirit of love, kindness, and the message of hope and peace that Christmas brings.

"And she gave birth to her firstborn son and wrapped him in bands of cloth, and laid him in a manger, because there was no place for them in the inn." (Luke 2:7 NRSV)



Is there room in our hearts for Jesus this Christmas? As we consider making space for Jesus, are we also making room for those around us who may be struggling, lonely, or in need? What would it look like if we made room for love, grace, and peace this special season?

We hosted 15 Vendors; plus our own Upper Room who brought in amazing products and helped make sale successful. Thanksgiving Baskets—Thank you to all who donated! We delivered 14 Thanksgiving baskets.










