By the time you read this letter, you may already know the outcome of the U.S. presidential election, or you might still be waiting. Since 2016, our nation has become deeply divided. This division goes beyond just race, ethnicity, or gender—it's much more complicated and hard to fully understand. People are split over a wide range of issues, from politics to values, and these differences aren't always easy to pinpoint or explain. Some might blame the candidates for creating this division, but that's only part of the story. Our divide runs deeper, reflecting broader disagreements about what kind of country we want to be, how we should move forward, and how we see the future. The reasons behind it are complex, touching on economic struggles, cultural changes, and shifting beliefs that have caused people to view each other with distrust, and even fear. It's not just the political leaders driving this; it's the environment we've been living in for years now, which has fueled this sense of separation. In the midst of this growing division, it's easy to feel disheartened and disconnected. Yet, even in these difficult times, there are stories that remind us of the power of kindness and understanding, even in the face of deep disagreement. One such story that I shared back in 2020 seems especially relevant today.

This story comes from Pastor David Earl Ross, a highly respected minister within the Korean Christian community in Washington. He and his wife, both fluent in Korean, moved to Korea in 1961 and spent 25 years serving there, leaving a profound and lasting impact on the Korean Christian community. Here's the story they shared:

We were having breakfast in a local restaurant a few days ago, when we overheard a discussion by two middle aged gentlemen. The two men were good friends. But one was rich, the other poor. One was a Republican, the other Democrat. Their ideas conflicted with each other, especially when they talked about the upcoming presidential election in the United States. What impressed me was the kindness, openness, and willingness to listen to one another's ideas without exploding in anger and walking away with hostility. They disagreed very strongly, but they were willing to listen. They even hugged one another as they left the restaurant. Ellen and I, and the waitress, wanted to applaud! Most importantly, they maintained their friendship and allowed the other to disagree, even strongly. Their disagreements did not destroy their relationship with one another. In this ear of conflict in so many nations—great and bitter division in the United States over politics and economics, and great and bitter division in South Korea over politics and economics—it has been sad to see relationships destroyed and friendships dissolve. This may be inevitable for non-Christians, although I do not think it should be so. However, it is deeply ironic and immature for Christians to be so proud and stubborn and self-righteous that they are not able to have a good, strong disagreement with one another and still accept, welcome, and love one another as Christ accepts, welcomes, and loves us. I am wondering if the world can detect any difference between Christians and non-Christians when we talk about things pertaining to nations and world affairs. I choose to believe we can make a difference. Only in Jesus!

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No matter the outcome of the election of 2024, it's important to respond with calm and respect. We shouldn't let frustration or anger drive our reactions. Instead, let's focus on showing kindness and understanding to those around us, even when we disagree. Our unity in Christ is stronger than any political result, and we can choose to approach this moment with grace, trusting in His guidance.

Are we willing to stay respectful and open when interacting with those who hold opposing views? What actions can we take to preserve unity and peace, even when we feel strongly about particular issues? How can our faith shape our responses and attitudes when faced with differing opinions? As we navigate these challenging times and the differences that may arise, let us remember the words of Romans 12:18 —"If it is possible, so far as it depends on you, live peaceably with all."

May we strive to be instruments of peace, choosing respect and understanding, even when we don't see eye to eye. Through God's guidance, we can reflect His love in how we treat one another.
