Sometime between 2:00 PM on Sunday August 22 and 8:30 the next morning, one or more thieves broke in to the church building. They took a stepping stone from near the tool shed, went down into the gully, and threw the stone through a classroom window. From there they jumped to the basement floor and then proceeded to the church office. They kicked in Daniel's office door to enter the office area. Daniel and Teresa feel as though the Pastor's and Secretary's offices seemed complete. The finance office did not fare as well. Joan's desk and two file cabinets were broken into. They took a box of unused church checks. Loss of money was limited to a zip lock bag of pennies, but they also took files containing deposit records, including bank statements and deposit slips. One file had copies of member checks from January. Some of Joan's personal property was missing. They also took the bank bag that we use to carry the offering downstairs. Inside the bag was an office key and a key to Joan's desk. Upstairs in the CE building, the (empty) cash register used for upper room sales was taken. A light was found on in Memorial Lounge, but nothing else seemed amiss anywhere in the old church building.

The church already has new bank accounts. We have contacted the members who wrote checks in January and shared the news along with tips from various bankers on how to combat potential attacks on their checking accounts. As of the following Wednesday, the police have little to go on, but were beginning to knock on doors in the neighborhood for possible tips. Chuck made temporary repairs to the window, John replaced the lock on Joan's desk, and Dan and Hazen swapped Daniel's office door with a classroom door from downstairs.

Members are asked to be alert for anything that they see or miss in the church that might need reporting. John is maintaining a list for the insurance company. We are welcoming many great suggestions on how best to move past this event!

DESCRIPTION OF FIRST PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH FOR CITY OF MISHAWAKA HISTORIC LANDMARK APPLICATION

Construction on the First Presbyterian Church at 401 Lincoln Way East, Mishawaka, IN was started in 1909 and completed in 1911 at a cost of \$30,000 (\$88,745,000 today). It is located in the Beiger Historic District east of the city's central business district, at the northeast corner of Union Street and LWE. The building has an "Outstanding" designation on p. 95 of the <u>City of Mishawaka Summary Report, Indiana Historic Sites and Structures Inventory dated 1995.</u> This report describes the architecture as Classical Revival style, while the church history describes it as Georgian. The architect was the firm of Badgley & Nicklas of Cleveland, Ohio. They note the building as "fine type of New England Colonial architecture."

Building materials consist of red brick and "dressed" buffed stone used for the columns, tracery and keystones. Exterior dimensions (including the portico and steps) are 85 x 94 feet. All 57 windows (including basement windows) are original and made of leaded glass. They were purchased for \$1,600 from VonGerichten Art Glass Co., Columbus, Ohio. In today's dollars cost would be \$4,733,104.

For purposes of this application, the outstanding landmark designation is being sought only for the original red brick building facing LWE. It does not include a 2-story tan brick addition from 1960; while the addition meets the landmark age requirement, its materials and design are not commensurate with the historic landmark guidelines.

Facade, LWE:

The front portico has 4 pairs of stone pillars with Doric capitals supporting a pitched red tile roof. The cornice and gutters are copper. The red brick triangular pediment has a circular stained glass window with 4 keystone motifs. The stone entablatures has fluted ornamentation. There are 11 stairs leading to the front entrance, where there are 3 sets of double doors with stained glass fanlights surrounded by stone arches with a keystone.

West Side, Union Street:

Here are 3 large arched stained glass windows with capstones, each containing 15 stained glass panels. They contain religious phrases in Greek and Latin. At the north and south corners are 2 rounded niches, each containing 4 small stained glass windows.

Southwest, Rear:

Located here is one very large stained glass window. Although not especially noticeable on the exterior, this window is a prominent feature in the sanctuary. It depicts Jesus in the Garden of Gethsemane.

Bell Tower:

Atop the church is a classic octagonal bell tower in the style of noted architect, Christopher Wren. It is made of copper with a weather vane spire, a faceted ogee dome, and a stone balustrade. The tower is supported by 8 pillars with composite capitals and adorned with 4 arched stained glass panels set in brick at the tower's base. It is further adorned with 4 ornamental stone urns atop scrolled stone pedestals.

East Side:

The exterior features 12 stained glass rectangular windows with keystones. They are placed symmetrically atop each other with 6 on each of the 2 floors of the building. Natural light for the basement is provided by 4 leaded glass windows.

In summary, it would be nearly impossible to duplicate the building's classical architecture, quality of construction materials, and workmanship today.
