Back in late December, some experts predicted that everyone would be exposed to the virus in the next few months as the new variant "Omicron" started spreading like wildfire across our nation. In early January, I was diagnosed with Covid-19, and had to quarantine myself for 10 days at home. Since my symptoms were not severe enough to notice, I thought I had a cold since as we had some rather chilly-cold days in January. Unfortunately, a home Covid test came out positive.

I couldn't believe that I had Covid. Around the time I was diagnosed, the latest news headlines caught my attention: **"Covid-19 hospitalizations reach record high, HHS data shows".** The increased demand for testing has caused shortages and people are expressing their fear and frustrations. Unfortunately, some of our FPC family and friends have also been diagnosed with Covid in past months. Once Jae found out that I had Covid, she was more realistic about the fact that both Gabie and she would get infected. So, she went out for groceries to get necessary food supplies for the next 10 days. Jae sees that Covid is going to remain with us for a long time. A few days later, Jae and Gabie started showing Covid symptoms. While we are waiting to see the light at the end of the Covid tunnel, we must learn continually how to live with Covid. I was surprised to see the long lines of waiting cars to get tested at a drive-through testing site in Goshen. A volunteer at the testing site told me that they ran out of rapid tests, they could only offer me a molecular/test which would take much longer to get results.

Like the prediction, we are hearing about significant growth in Covid cases and hospitalization in recent months. And, I have been pondering about why we must go through this unprecedented time and challenges. What is God's intention allowing this pandemic in our age? What is *your* response to this crisis? Where do you think we should go from here? How & what does it mean to live with Covid?

We as believers shouldn't panic or be anxious about our current pandemic crisis. In Paul's letter to the Philippians, Paul encourages his beloved friends in Philippi: **"Do not be anxious about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God."** (Philippians 4:6) Is it possible for believers to be anxious for nothing? Paul wants the believers in Philippi to acknowledge their dependence on God and his provision through their prayer. Prayer cures anxiety. It removes our fear and frustration.

The psalmist says, "I sought the Lord, and he answered me; he delivered me from all of my fears." (Psalm 34:4) When we seek the Lord, he answers, delivering us from all our fears – fear of our unknown future, fear of losing jobs, family, friends and even fear of dying. The Lord wants us to depend on him amid this pandemic crisis because he is our refuge and strength an ever-present help in times of trouble. (Psalm 46:1)

The Lord invites us to pray because he is with us and wants us to rely on his presence. Let his loving presence wrap around you and guide you to his path. Living with Covid means we need to look after those who are vulnerable. Jesus said to his disciples, "A new commandment I give to you, that you love one another; as I have loved you, that you also love one another." (John 13:34) Our primary obligation as believers is to love one another as Christ loved us. We love others because we understand how much God has done for us. And, in response to his love, we serve our neighbors through our gifts and callings.

What is our calling, our responsibility in this ongoing pandemic crisis? What does loving your neighbor look like in our current situations? How can you be a good neighbor – God's witness to those around you? Ask God to give you wisdom and show you creative ways to love your neighbor today. "Everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you love one another." (John 13:35)

They are always looking for volunteers – they are open Tuesday night 6-7:30 pm and Fridays 10-11:30 am. Staple items include cereal, peanut butter, soups, canned vegetables and fruit, rice, pasta, meats (canned and packaged) and toiletries. They also have someone available to help with gas cards and utility bills. The M.A.C. Pantry is located in Albright Church 504 W. Mishawaka Ave. Mishawaka, Indiana.

The **Mishawaka Food Pantry** is located at 315 Lincolnway West. In addition to food they provide clothing, hot lunches, family development, toiletries, transportation solutions, and most importantly, a sense of community. The Pantry provides a space for individuals with similar stories and experiences to come together in their cafe that serves free lunches Tuesdays through Thursdays. The Pantry is committed to providing a caring and friendly atmosphere that will leave clients feeling more confident, hopeful, and empowered.

Per Capita

Per Capita is an annual per member apportionment assessed by the General Assembly and by many synods and presbyteries, to enable Presbyterians mutually and equitably to share the ecclesiastical and administrative costs of sustaining our witness to Christ through the Presbyterian Church (USA). It is not a tax on members; it is a benevolence that links congregations with presbytery, synod and General Assembly to explore and sustain ministry and mission locally, nationally and globally.

The earliest Presbyterian General Assemblies in the U.S. met annually, always in Philadelphia. As the church expanded into far-off places like Ohio, Kentucky, and Missouri, attendance at the Assembly became prohibitively expensive to frontier commissioners.

In order to share the costs of bringing the whole church together, in 1806 the Assembly began development of a "Commissioner Travel Expense Fund." Over the years this came to be known as per capita.

The Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) is a connectional church. Presbyterian congregations worship, serve, and govern together. Per capita contributions fund the shared governing responsibilities for the whole church and contributions provide almost the entire budget of the Office of the General Assembly. Some expenses of the Presbyterian Mission Agency are also funded by per capita, including the Office of the Executive Director, the PMA Board, communications, advisory and advocacy committees.

Per Capita in the Presbytery

The portion of per capita contributions that stay in our presbytery compose the majority of the Presbytery's annual budget. From support of congregations' ministry and mission through grants, programs and staff support to nurturing the next generation of ordained leaders for ministry, our contributions make a huge impact on ministry in north central Indiana. The Presbytery retains its share and pays the whole per capita amount owed to both the Synod and the General Assembly. The Presbytery pays this entire apportionment, whether or not the per capita funds from each congregation are received. When congregations do not pay, the presbytery must allocate money from other income that could be used for mission.

The 2021 per capita apportionment is \$42.03 which includes \$8.98 for General Assembly, \$3.81 for the Synod of Lincoln Trails and \$29.24 for the Presbytery of Wabash Valley. If you are able to help with the FPC Mishawaka per capita expense, please use the blue envelope included in the January portion of your offering envelope box or write per capita on your check's memo line.
