#### A MESSAGE FROM PASTOR DANIEL

"This book of the law shall not depart out of your mouth; you shall meditate on it day and night, so that you may be careful to act in accordance with all that is written in it." Joshua 1:8

God suggests to the people of Israel through Moses' predecessor "Joshua" that taking Canaan as known as Promise Land will require faith, courage and great effort. Joshua the leader of the Israelites worries and wonders about whether he could be like Moses who was wise, courageous and strong.

Then the LORD comes and speaks to Joshua quietly and insistently, "I will be with you, just as I was with Moses. Be strong, be courageous, and obey all the law I gave to Moses."

First, the LORD grants faith in Joshua's heart so that he would feel confident leading the entire camp of Israel to the land that he had promised with Abraham, Isaac and Jacob.

After giving an assurance of his presence with Joshua, the LORD commands him to be obedient to the law which was given through Moses at Mt. Sinai. He specifically instructs Joshua to mediate on the law day and night.

What is "meditation"? Meditation in Bible sense is to think intently and at length, as for spiritual purposes. By reading and thinking the words of the text, we enter into the world of the text. Meditation is the way that we can engage and encounter God's spiritual presence. Through meditation, God speaks to us, and we respond to his voice.

Have you heard about "Lectio Divina" which is an ancient contemplative spiritual practice? In Lectio Divina, we seek to experience God's presence through meditating the Scripture.

Here is a guideline for *Lectio Divina* which is instructed by Henri Nouwen:

Choose a passage of scripture to read aloud, slowly, attentively once through. Pause to let the passage sink in. Resist a familiar understanding, even of a familiar passage. Allow yourself to hear the story anew.

Reread the passage, piece by piece. Note the story line and questions raised. Again, resist the familiar interpretation. Look for a word or two in the story. Explore the passage the way a child might explore a strange room, in the spirit of curiosity and openness.

Read the passage a third time. What word or words jump out at you, commanding your attention? Stay with that word as long as you can. Meditate on it. Chew on it. Is God speaking a personal word to you today? Contemplate the personal word for you today in the written word.

Although the meditation requires our time and effort, it helps us to participate in hearing and recognizing the Word in our own lives. Therefore, even in our busy life, we should set aside for our time with God and tune into his presence by reading, reflecting, resting and responding in his Word.

"Happy are those whose delight is in the law of the LORD, and on his law they meditate day and night." - Psalm 1:2-

#### **NEWS FROM THE MAC**

Things remain about the same at the MAC as far as those who are in need of help. Some items that are very hard to find these days are cereal, spaghetti and rice (preferably microwaveable). Of course all donations are appreciated greatly but these are just some of the "hot" items. The grocery cart in the front lobby is ready and waiting to be filled up!

And sadly, the Pantry's truck has made its last trip. They are looking at options for getting it replaced or other methods for delivering/picking up orders. Anything you can help with would be huge for those who depend on the Pantry.

The need at the food pantry is ALWAYS an ongoing one. After a brief conversation with one of the workers, she mentioned the basic personal needs, toothpaste and brush; deodorant; soap--bar or soft; female items; and of course toilet paper. And for the families cereal, canned soup, pasta--any kind, instant rice, canned fruits. And let's not forget any and all thanksgiving meal items are in high demand. Lastly a kindly reminder that children are often home for some part of the week now so items they themselves can make/eat are very welcomed. And there are so many individual grocery items now, so fun!

## It's Stewardship Time!

We've been talking back and forth about what we could possibly put together for a Stewardship program in this year of all years. Even before 2020 changed our perspective on all things of this earth, there seems to be less and less that our very faithful group needs to be told. A small but dedicated church family of stewards has remained supportive. Some of those stewards fill out a pledge card every year, some don't but still give reliably. Stewards of the past put away funds for the rainy years that we experience in the twenty-first century, and we somehow manage to need to withdraw far less than we expect.

## So here's what wasn't in the budget!

The year began with us writing a check for nearly \$25,000 for boiler replacements completed in 2019. This money was taken from the "Energy Fund," established a couple of decades back when we were given a large bequest. By mid-March, the investments line shrunk by about \$27,000 as the markets reacted to the global pandemic. That loss was temporary, and as of the end of September, our investments are now ahead for the year. In the spring, a drunk driver amazingly survived a horrible collision with our Lincoln Way sign. The sign fared worse. A new sign is in place, at a cost just over \$37,000. Insurance paid \$15,000, and the membership rose to the occasion to more than make up the difference\*. Over the summer, a \$19,000 grant from the Smock Foundation completely paid for the upgrade to the main restroom in the CE first-floor hallway. It is now handicap-accessible. Oh, and we closed the church to worshipers for a couple of months. You might expect that would have been devastating to pledge receipts, but no, not so much. Actually, we're seeing more of a downturn more recently, because some thoughtful stewards stepped up and paid their entire pledge for the year in February, March, and April.

## Then, how do we stand now?

Three quarters into 2020, we're in the red \$14,364. We'd certainly rather be closer to breaking even, but then again, the budget that we approved last January projected far worse! Giving is ahead of budget by more than \$6000 without counting the extra-mile giving to replace the sign. Spending, as is normal for us, is less than expected.

\*(The final report is incomplete on the sign ordeal. There have been other unfinished costs, including site clean-up and repairs to the downspout at the northeast corner of the building. If insurance pays for those, as we expect, then the congregation's support will have MORE than paid for the damages. The total will end up pretty close either way.)

For those wanting to make a pledge for 2021, a pledge card is attached. You may mail it in or put it in a collection plate. Since circumstances are so wildly unusual, there won't be a formal presentation of cards this year. God will provide, through His stewards past, present, and future.

## BLASTS FROM THE PAST

In searching through museum items for interesting tidbits, I keep running across groups that have been prominent in past years in the church but no longer exist. This is understandable since in those days the membership exceeded 600 people. But even though we are now much smaller, wouldn't it be nice once all the craziness brought on by the pandemic has passed, to revisit some of these various groups and activities and perhaps see if there could be interest in reviving them? If nothing else, perhaps just seeing what there used to be will bring back fond memories for some of you!

In the very first newsletter from August of 1961, mention was made of a Junior-Hi Fellowship and Senior-Hi Fellowship group, citing some interesting sounding activities. Of course, those would only be possible if the church were to get an infusion of young people but it is something to think about.

There was also something called a Day Apart which was held at a member's cabin and sounded like just a lovely retreat day.

In a 1971 newsletter, mention was made of forming a group called the Lamplighter Group which focused on learning, studying, sharing and growing together in true Christian spirit. There were also several special interest group activities, among them planting terrariums and talk of starting a book exchange. Around Mother's Day there was a mother-daughter banquet which also included a musical program. Events such as pancake and sausage breakfasts and pizza parties with movies shown were also featured in a 1981 newsletter.

Think about what was good about the past in the church and what could be taken from those ideas to benefit everyone now. Of course this is food for thought once life returns to some sort of normalcy in restrictions but it could be something to look forward to!
